2017 Golf Cart Parade – a Desert Safari

Celebrate the return of a treasured local tradition and one of the desert's most fun and colorful events on Sunday, October 29, when scores of decorated carts, floats, and marching bands head down world famous El Paseo for the 53rd annual Palm Desert Golf Cart Parade.

Organized by the Palm Desert Area Chamber of Commerce, the Palm Desert Golf Cart Parade is the largest parade of its kind and a popular favorite that attracts people from across the desert and around the world.

This year's parade, celebrating the theme, "Desert Safari," steps off at noon led by the 29 Palms 1st Marine Division Band and featuring Grand Marshal Gavin MacLeod of *The Love Boat* and *The Mary Tyler Moore Show* fame.

The day's fun begins at 8 a.m. with the annual Palm Desert Rotary Pancake Breakfast in the Bank of America parking lot (El Paseo and San Luis Rey). Sponsor and golf booths open at 9 a.m. along with a Golf Cart Show that will give distributors and proud owners a chance to show off their historic and hot-rod carts and compete for a People's Choice Award. Other attractions include a Kid's Play Zone sponsored by the Webb Foundation, food and drink vendors, awards and trophy presentations, and more.

Palm Desert Waste & Recycling Rates Remain Low

The Palm Desert City Council recently approved small increases to the rates that residents and businesses pay for waste and recycling services.

The increases – 62 cents a month for most residential customers and \$11.85 per week for larger businesses – were requested by Burrtec Waste and Recycling Services, the City's contracted waste hauler. The purpose of the request was to help cover increased costs as the result of a variety of factors including: increased tipping fees at Riverside County landfills; legislation raising California's minimum wage; and new regulations regarding the recycling of food waste.

Even with the recent increase, Palm Desert residents and businesses still pay among the lowest rates in the Coachella Valley for waste and recycling services as illustrated in the adjacent chart.

In 2015, the City Council approved tax roll billing for residential trash collection in Palm Desert. Instead of receiving quarterly bills from Burrtec, property owners now see a separate fee on their annual property tax bill that accounts for each property owner's share of the cost of waste collection across the community. The change helps maintain Palm Desert's quality of life by guaranteeing the regular removal of waste from all homes, regardless of whether residents are paying their trash bill.

While Palm Desert takes pride in its low waste and recycling rates, the decisions to modestly increase rates and to switch to tax roll billing demonstrate the City's commitment to ensuring that Palm Desert remains a clean and beautiful community. Bike Friendly Palm Desert is Becoming More So

Palm Desert is the perfect place to explore on two wheels – whether you prefer a leisurely loop through the City on paved streets or a challenging climb to scenic vistas via local trails.

The City was an early leader in creating a network of bicycle and golf cart lanes that could be used to get around town without a car.



Today, Palm Desert has more than 42 miles of paved bike lanes and another 23 miles of designated bike routes and pathways. In addition, the City boasts more than half-a-dozen offroad trails that are open to bikes. The City's new General Plan aims to create an even better connected bicycle network that facilitates and encourages cycling for travel to work, school, and shopping, as well as for recreation and exercise.

To accomplish this, the City will prioritize and capitalize on opportunities to provide bicycle facilities that further connect the community and require new development to provide sufficient onsite bicycle parking.

The City's Vision San Pablo project is a great example. Scheduled to break ground in summer 2018, the project will remake San Pablo Avenue by reducing traffic lanes to widen sidewalks and provide buffered bike lanes. The goal is to create a pedestrian and bicycle friendly connection between El Paseo and Highway 111 and the Civic Center, College of the Desert, and CV Link.

Vacation Rentals – Balancing Community Interests

The City wants to preserve the qualities that make Palm Desert desirable to residents and visitors while respecting the rights of property owners.

Recent developments in nearby communities have led to concerns that Palm Desert might experience a significant increase in the number of short-term rental properties, which could threaten the character of our community.

In an effort to avoid this and plan thoughtfully and fairly for the future, the Palm Desert City Council passed a temporary moratorium on new short-term rental permits in the City. The year-long moratorium has provided the City with time to evaluate the opportunities and challenges posed by the increasing popularity of vacation rentals and discuss strategies that respect the rights of homeowners while preserving neighborhoods and the fabric of our community.

During the moratorium, an ad hoc committee composed of concerned residents, vacation rental owners, realtors, tourism industry professionals, City Council representatives, and other stakeholders has been meeting to discuss the issues surrounding this complex topic and formulate long-term solutions to recommend to the City Council.

Issues related to vacation rentals that have been discussed include:

- Enhanced enforcement and increasing violation fees
- Homeowners Association (HOA) self-governance
- Better communication between the City and HOAs regarding permits
- Increasing the three night minimum stay to five nights
- Concerns about investors buying multiple properties on the same street for vacation rentals
- Outdoor music
- Concerns from residents who live next to rental properties about experiencing a different renter every weekend
- Investor property improvements
